
# Raiders fail to heed coach's dire warning

Tust hours before the Georgetown Raiders hit the ice for Tuesday's game against the Streetsville Derbys, Raider coach Dan Cameron reminded his team to stay focused.

The Streetsville Derbys rallied from a 2-0 deficit to edge the Raiders 3-2. It was just the second time in 16 games Georgetown has failed to earn a point.

But even Cameron wasn't about to come down on his players.

"It's easy for people to say, 'How could you lose to those guys?' The bottom line is last time we played them we scored eight goals so it's human nature that the players are

going to be overconfident. That team knocked off Milton a week ago. Their goalie played well. We put some pressure on them but what can you say? Full marks to them."

The Raiders, who fired 52 shots at Dayn Belfour the last time the teams met, managed exactly half that total this time around. Still, they jumped out to a lead when Tyler Leggo put Georgetown in front with the only goal of the opening period and Jay Sprague extended the lead in the second.



Lapointe shot a round of 67 Wednesday at the Rio Mar Country Club's River Course to take the individual opening round lead. Combined with teammate Laura Matthews' two-under par

70, Canada was seven under par for a twoshot advantage over the United States.

Although Lapointe struggled, shooting a 78 on Thursday when the event moved to the Rio Mar Ocean Course, Canada
