Senior Rebels face stiff test this weekend

he Georgetown Rebels will get a chance to see how L they measure up with the province's best teams this weekend.

While Georgetown has rarely been tested in building a 5-0 record in Halton senior boys volleyball play, the Rebels have been using tournaments as a measuring stick. And although they have fared well in three tournaments so far, they have rarely had their full lineup available.

At York University, the Rebels lost to the defending provincial medallists, London's Saunders Secondary, in the semifinals and finished third. In Guelph, the Rebels reached the final before losing to Belleville's Centennial. In Calgary, they won the consolation they went 2-4. championship.

In speaking to other coaches from around the province, Rebel coach Jonas Kaciulis said his team is probably ranked fourth in the province, behind Saunders, Centennial London's and Oakridge. The Rebels will be guaranteed to meet Oakridge, the only member of the top three they haven't faced yet, when Saunders hosts a tournament this weekend.


"We know where we stand," Kaciulis said. "We have a shot at a medal and if you look back, half way through 2000 (when the Rebels won the Ontario championship) we were ranked third.

They worked hard and adjusted and just didn't want to lose again. This team, skill wise, is as good or better."

One difference is the depth of this year's Rebel squad. Kaciulis has 14 players, the biggest roster he has ever carried. That had a lot to do with the large number of returning players as well as a strong group of graduating juniors. By keeping more players, Kaciulis will keep the team's future strong as well.

But the present also represents one of the Rebels' best teams ever assembled. Reid Hall and Duncan Cairns both won Ontario beach volleyball titles in the summer. Hall then went on to represent Canada at the world Under-18 championships and finished fourth. Scott Cavasin was named to the tournament all-star team at York and Hall and setter Mike Haines earned the same honour in Guelph. And then there's Nic Turnhout, a powerful hitter, who Kaciulis said is among the school's best players ever.

The team's depth has pushed its starters. Playing shorthanded at a tournament, Gavin Viray-Cox moved to middle and excelled and now has created a competition with Goran Vlacic for the starter's role.


And the first-year seniors are also keeping the starters sharp.

"They have proven they can handle it. It took them probably four to six weeks to adjust to what is expected of them. The guys have confidence in them and they've earned that. If someone's not mentally into a game or not sharp, they can step in."

With so many new players joining a group of veterans it could have been easy for a divide to form in the team but Kaciulis said the trip to Calgary turned out to be a valuable team experience.

"That really meant a lot for them," the Rebel coach said. "They worked really hard toward that and represented themselves well and the community really helped out us with out fund-raising to make that happen."


