Humanitarian worker recounts first-hand experience of Darfur crisis

cton's Trinity United Church has invited a humanitarian worker to Lupdate the community on his work in the war-stricken region of Darfur in Sudan, Africa.

Gary Kenny, Area Secretary for Southern Africa and Secretary for Emergency Response, Justice, Globe and Ecumenical Relations Unit of the United Church of Canada will speak on Wednesday, Nov. 3, 7:30 p.m. at Trinity Church, 70 Mill St., E.

Darfur is the site of what the United Nations is calling the world's worst humanitarian crisis. Some 1.5 million farmers have been forcibly displaced from their land. Between 30,000 and 50,000 Darfuri have died. International food aid has been used as a weapon of war. Human rights groups are alleging crimes against humanity, ethnic cleansing and even genocide.

Canadian churches are attempting to respond to the upheaval and suffering in Darfur in many ways including providing humanitarian aid and political and human rights advocacy. One such organization is the Canadian Foodgrains Bank, a coalition of 13 faith-based agencies. In July the CFGB sent a delegation, including Kenny, to assess the humanitarian needs and to prepare a suitable Canadian response.

Some of the issues to be raised for discussion on Nov. 3 will include:

- Is food aid always a good thing?
- · When is food aid more of a problem than a solution?
- · Does the responsibility of food aid agencies end with the donating of the food?

 Should food aid agencies like the CFGB be investigating the cause of people's hunger and addressing those causes? How might they do this?

Kenny is a member of the CFGB board of directors. Prior to joining the United Church of Canada he worked as a human rights research and advocate with KAIROS: Canadian Ecumenical Justice Initiatives and before that, was director of the Inter-Church Coalition on Africa.
