Rebels reach tournament semis

The Georgetown Rebels continue to inch closer to their goal of an A Ontario Federation of Schools Athletic Association (OFSAA) medal.

The Rebels reached the semifinals of a tournament hosted by the defending provincial champion, London's Saunders Secondary. The tournament featured nine of the province's top-10 senior boys' volleyball teams and it took the number one-ranked Saunders to knock the Rebels out of the tournament. The 25-19, 25-21 loss to Saunders showed that Georgetown is closing the gap.

"They still are a fine-tuned team and showed they deserve the number one-ranking," said Rebel coach Jonas Kaciulis, "but that match was some of the best high school volleyball I've seen. Both teams wanted it.

The Rebels, ranked fourth in the province, beat the fifth-ranked Chatham-Kent 25-19, 25-18 in the quarterfinals.

In pool play, the Rebels split with second ranked Oakridge 25-18, 15-25 and McGregor before taking Chippewa in two straight games.


The Rebels split their team with their first-year senior players playing in a tournament at E.C. Drury, where they won the consolation championship. They took their match with the eventual champions, St. Clair, to three games.
