Town bumps rental cost of marquee signs

etting the message out won't be _free anymore— at least not on I the Town of Halton Hills marquee signs.

Council approved a policy—replacing its 1994 one—that will increase the price of renting its marquee signs at Mold-Masters SportsPlex, the Gellert Community Centre and the soon-to-bebuilt sign at the Acton Arena and Community Centre, starting January 1.

Currently users of the facility are not charged for use of the sign and affiliated groups, local non-profit groups and service clubs are charged \$25 for three days.

But now all will be charged a base rate of \$100 for seven days, with discounts according to group status, number of sides of the marquee used, number of lines, and duration of the advertising. For example, a non-profit group using five lines on the sign for seven days would pay \$80.

A volume discount would be given to regular users of the sign such as the Georgetown Jr. A hockey Raiders or the Junior B lacrosse Bulldogs. Another change is that commercial groups will

now be allowed to use the signs.

Town staff justifies the increase by saying the locations of the signs provide excellent visibility, reach and overall value for the advertising dollars. Based on daily traffic stats, the Mold-Masters SportsPlex sign on Guelph St. would get 189,000 hits per week, the Gellert Centre on Main St. S., 43,750 and the Acton Arena sign on Queen St., 87,500 hits.

Staff will use a priority ranking to allocate advertising space: facility user, Recreation and Parks Department, municipal use, registered groups, service clubs, local non-profit groups and commercial groups.

It is expected the Town will realize a minimum \$9,000 annual profit from the new fees.


