Green Belt Plan will affect Halton Hills

n October 28, the province released its first draft of the Green Belt Plan for the Greater Toronto Area (GTA) area.

In looking at the draft map, about one half of Halton Hills is included in the Green Belt. Most of this area lies west of Georgetown and, for the most part, parallels the eastern edge of the Niagara Escarpment. The province is planning public meetings and three locations that are close by are Oakville (November 10), Burlington (November 16) and Caledon East (November 29). This latest release will be reviewed to better understand the implication to the town.

The province also announced it is introducing new legislation to manage the long-term growth prospects in the GTA which is intended to accommodate an additional 4 million people and 2 million new jobs by 2031. The Town is affected by this provincial initiative and we are monitoring it very closely to better understand the effects it could have on our town. 
Have you ever gone to the arena and witnessed abuse of Town property, or an abusive parent screaming at their child, coach,

Boundaries set for new students at Four Corners

Students moving into the west end of the Four Corners development will attend St. Catherine of Alexandria next year.

Though most students in that area will actually live closer to St. Brigid, the Catholic school board students will be directed to St. Catherine because St. Brigid is at its capacity. St. Brigid was projected to have 806 students for the 2004/05 school year. St. Catherine, a similar sized school, was projected to have 551 students, making it better equipped to handle the new students.

A committee comprised of three school council members from each of the schools as well as three Halton Catholic District School Board staff members made the recommendation to the board.

Halton Hills Trustee Irene McCauley said the committee did a good job in coming up with the final scenario.

"The committee presented twice to the board and worked very hard to get input from everyone," she said.


The committee reviewed different scenarios and got input from the community at a Sept. 21 meeting. The board approved the proposal at last Tuesday's meeting.

The redirected area is west of Mountainview Rd., north of 10 Sideroad, east of Eighth Line and south of the existing housing in Georgetown south. Transportation will be available for those students who qualify under the board's policy. Which students qualify won't be known until decisions are made on location of sidewalks, crossing guards and other factors.






