Sponsored by Del Ridge Homes, this year's Bee will take place at Halton Hills Banquet Hall in Milton and will begin at 5 p.m.

Individual tickets are \$25 and include dinner. Audience members can test their spelling prowess during the Milton Lions Audience Play-a-Long Spelling Bee which occurs throughout the night, or bid on an array of silent auction prizes while watching the fun and cheering on their favourite team. Tickets can be purchased at Coles Book store in Milton Mall; Literacy North Halton office, 72 Mill St., Georgetown; and Delacourts in downtown Milton.



Want green grass? Go to Section 635 at the Halton Hills Public Library

I just can't do it. I cannot keep my lawn green. As a result I am a frequent visitor to the 635's of the adult non-fiction section, better known as the gardening books. I found myself there again this week searching for ways to turn my "mosaic of mud" into anything green (at least until the bugs start getting hungry) and was quite amazed by the variety of topics I

found there. Here are a few examples:

If lawns are your challenge, Lawns, Grasses and Groundcovers by Lewis and Nancy Hill has step-by-step instructions for planting and caring for traditional lawns and some less traditional but easy-care substitutions. Creating the Prairie Xeriscape by Sara Williams takes this concept one step further and describes how water-guzzling lawns can be replaced with beau-



tiful, low maintenance, drought resistant plants.

Speaking of water, ponds and other garden water features are

becoming increasingly popular. Container Water Gardens by Philip Swindells includes plans for all kinds of water features that do not involved any digging and can even be constructed on a deck or indoors. Don't forget your indoor gardens. There are many books demystifying the more challenging aspects of growing houseplants, including Orchid Growing for Wimps by Ellen Zachos. (I wonder if they have a book on lawns

in that series?)


