

Chambers united for advocacy

A ccountability, less red tape and strategic tax cuts are part of the strong new mandate given to the Ontario Chamber of Commerce (OCC) by its membership at the 93 Annual General Meeting held recently.

In total, a record 35 policy resolutions were adopted by the membership following vigorous debate including: Eliminating the corporate minimum tax; creating a uniform business education tax rate; twinning the Trans Canada Highway; investing in and seeking efficiencies for international border crossings in Ontario; increasing funding for post-secondary education

"The chamber network is strong

and united— and that is great news for local business," said Norm Paget, President, Halton Hills Chamber of Commerce. "We are looking forward to working with our local government on a number of issues— knowing that the OCC and other chambers and boards from across the province will be standing with us."
