

day's (Thursday's) final round.

Lapointe, chasing her 12th Ontario Mid-Amateur title, pulled away from the field with seven birdies over the last 11 holes in Tuesday's opening round.


Lapointe closed out the front nine with back-to-back birdies to put her one under par for the round. She topped that with three straight starting on the 11th hole.

After a bogey on the 15th hole— one of only three in her round— Lapointe finished with a birdie on 16, par on 17 and her eighth birdie of the day on 18.

Although Lapointe has won the tournament 10 of the last 11 years, including the last four in a row, Tuesday's round marked the first time Lapointe had shot a round in the 60s at the Ontario Mid-Amateur.

Three golfers shot 75 on Tuesday to sit eight shots back of Lapointe. That group includes Etobicoke's Terrill Samuel, the only golfer other than Lapointe to win the Mid-Amateur since 1993.

Danny Duplantis of Georgetown and Greg Lagerquist of Erin finished tied for eighth in the juvenile division at the Ontario Golf Association Junior and Juvenile Boys Better Ball Championship.

The duo shot a two-over-par 73 at the Oakridge Golf Club in Port Perry.

Alex Hrycko and Steven Jackson of Toronto won by a stroke with a three-under 68.


