





159th edition runs three days

Georgetown Fall Fair opens Friday

The 159th annual Georgetown Fall Fair kicks off with crowning of the Fair Ambassador on Friday night.

The three-day fair, to be held Sept. 9-11 at the Georgetown Fairgrounds on Park Ave., includes agricultural exhibits, cattle and horse shows, midway, talent contests, homecrafts and antiques, demolition derby, tractor pulls, live entertainment, and much more.


"We're proud of our fair," said Georgetown Agricultural Society president John Nurse. "We welcome everyone to come out and experience this annual fall event. There is certainly something for everyone."

Tried and true favourites are back, he said, with some smaller new additions that add up to a great time.

The Ambassador competition begins 6 p.m. with the winner acting as the fair's representative during the remainder of the fair. Contestants are judged on their personality, charm, community knowledge, and includes an interview and a speech.

The popular lawn tractor races follow at 8 p.m.

Friday night entertainment also includes the Lifetime Drive Band from 7-8 p.m. with teen bands continuing to rock from 9-10:30 p.m.



A full day is planned on Saturday, kicking off with the annual Kinsmen Girls Softball tournament at 8 a.m. Highlights on this day also includes the English Horse Show, 9 a.m.; Halton 4-H Derby at 7 p.m.

The talent show gets under way at 11 a.m. with the winners showing their star quality at 4 p.m. Also at 4 p.m. is the Bubble Gum Blowing contest. Barney the Magician shows off his tricks during 1 p.m. and 3 p.m. shows.

Saturday night entertainment includes Rolly Rocker and the Hemi Heads, 5-7 p.m., the Lifetime Drive Band again at 8-9 p.m. and more teen bands, 9-10:30 p.m.

On Sunday, the poultry show at 9 a.m. starts the day at 9 a.m., followed by the heavy horse show at 10 a.m., the children's pet show at 10:30 a.m. and the Dog Agility and

Flyball demonstrations throughout the day.

For the little ones, the Kiddie Pedal Tractor Pull gets under way at noon followed at 12:30 p.m., by the big kids' Lawn and Tractor Pull-new this year.

Sunday's entertainment will include the talent show beginning at 10 a.m.; Bubble Gum Blowing Contest at 3:15 p.m.; Sneezy the Clown at 12:15 p.m., and rising country music star Alysha Brooke at 1:35 p.m.

Throughout the weekend, don't forget to drop by the homecrafts exhibit hall, the agricultural awareness tent, and browse by the ven-Rabbit Show, 9 a.m.; Junior Dairy dors' booths. For those working up Show, 11 a.m. and the Demolition an appetite, there will be plenty of concessions.

A weekend pass is \$15. Adult admission is \$5 on Friday, \$7 on Saturday, \$5 on Sunday. Children (aged 7-12) admission is \$3 any day. For children, aged six and under, admission is free. Parking is limited within Fairgrounds itself and it's on a first-come first-serve basis. Please respect local residents when parking on neighbouring streets; municipal lots are within walking distance. Fairground entrances are at Park Ave. and at Hyde Park Dr.

Paget added that the new office is wheelchair accessible, "enabling us to better serve the community and visitors as we promote Halton Hills as a tourism destination." In its new location the Chamber will continue to serve as a registered Ontario Tourism Office.

Sue Walker, general manager

of the Chamber, said the Chamber still has long-term plans to build its own office, a replica train station, on Town-owned land next to Christ the King Catholic High School, and is currently setting up a fund-raising committee.
