Easy rider

The question is really quite simple: Should a person who rides a bicycle as part of his work day be allowed to claim mileage expenses, the same as a person who drives a car?

Town council— with the exception of Ward 3's Mike Davis— believes the answer is no, and moved to close a loophole in the town's personnel policy manual at Tuesday's meeting. The wording in the manual now reads "motorized" vehicle

Davis, who in his first term as a councillor, has frequently differed from his colleagues on a number of matters and made headlines for some outrageous comments, managed to exploit this "loophole", much to the consternation of fellow councillors.

In 2004 Davis claimed more than \$1,500 in "other" expenses (80 per cent of which is made up of mileage, parking and 407 ETR fees)— the highest amount of any councillor. He admits he had "mixed up" records of both bicycle and auto use.

Clearly his colleagues saw his billing for bicycle wear and tear as unacceptable; he countered he was being environmentally responsible and shouldn't be treated differently for being

Frankly we believe Davis was stretching the spirit of the policy in this matter, knew he was making waves and enjoyed getting under the skin of his co-horts.

They have often been unable to fill or attend to time-related appointments out of town.

Is there a way we can create a registry to pool all the resources of all the generous volunteers and service clubs in Acton to be accessible with one phone call or from one location to relieve this most urgent need for many?
