

With just six regulars from last season in the lineup, the Georgetown Raiders title defence got off to a rocky start as they opened the Provincial Jr. A Hockey League season with a 3-1 loss to the Burlington Cougars and followed it up with a 4-4 tie with the Mississauga Chargers.

"It's definitely not the start we wanted," said

Raider captain Frank DeAngelis after Georgetown surrendered three thirdperiod goals in Saturday's loss to Burlington.

"We're missing a few guys but that's no excuse. We just missed a lot of opportunities. We had lots of chances we just didn't take advantage of them."

The opportunities were there again in Monday's tie. Despite playing their third game in four days, the Chargers jumped out to a 2-0 first-period lead. The Raiders fought back with goals by Mike Gurtler, Joey Piccone and Matt Sitko

but the Chargers pulled even before the end of the second.

Adam Campbell restored the Raider lead a minute into the

third but the Raiders failed to put the game away by not taking advantage of two power plays in the period. The sec-

ond man advantage carried into overtime, a necessity after Mississauga tied the game midway through the third.
