Educate your child about stranger danger

wo weeks ago, a 12-year-old boy in Georgetown had to deal with a sit-uation that he should never have been put in.

A stranger, driving a van, approached him and motioned the boy over. Very sensibly, the young fellow ran to a neighbour's house. The neighbour phoned 911 and the police attended. It was determined that the driver of the van was a cable repairman, and he did, indeed, have a work order for the house where the boy lived.

After the fact, the repairman realized that he should not have approached the boy, and actually commended the boy for taking he action that he did. All was well in the end.

I often talk to groups of kids about street-proofing. When I get to the "stranger danger" portion of the talk, I tell kids to do exactly what our young fellow did. I tell them that it is not appropriate for adults to ask children for directions. They should approach other adults. Maybe I should give talks to adults too, and tell them the rules.

Parents should talk to their children about these issues.

What would your child do if an adult approached your child and said that you had been injured, and that adult was supposed to drive your child to the hospital? Would they know how deal with that? If your child walks with other children, they are less likely to be approached by a

stranger. See if you can organize a walking group with other neighbourhood children.

Don't forget that it is not only strangers who can pose a threat to a child. Tell your children that they should not take a ride with anyone, even if they are known to them. Have a password that just your family or designated friends will know. That way if there is an emergency and a friend has to pick them up, they can use that code


Talk, talk, talk to your children, and then listen to them!
