

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Scouts, guides will be out in force for Saturday's annual Food Drive

eorgetown residents are encouraged to pick up some extra groceries this week and put them in the paper bag included in today's Independent & Free Press for the 15th Annual Scout/Guide Food Drive on Saturday.

The bags should be placed on residents' front steps by 9 a.m. Saturday when between 200 to 400 scouts and guides will be going door-to-door in Georgetown, Glen Williams and Stewarttown collecting the bags for Georgetown Bread Basket, which provides food for 180 adults and 108 children each week.

The food drive in Acton will be held next spring.

Darlene Moss, Scout/Guide Food Drive co-ordinator, said they would like to reach or exceed last year's amount of food collected, which was approximately 36,000 lbs. They would be really pleased to collect 40,000 lbs, she said.

She said the food bank's need continues to grow, and in the past, the drive brought in two-thirds of the food required by the food bank to operate for the year, but now it is not even bringing in 50 per cent of the food needed.

"If each person gave one item more, that would make such a difference," said Moss. "We're just hoping the community is going to be generous."

Marian Viant of Georgetown Bread Basket said items most needed by the food bank this year are canned meat and stew, canned fish, jam, cheese spreads, canned juice and juice boxes, powdered milk, canned milk, canned fruits and vegetables, nutritious snacks for children, mini fruit cups, peanut butter and personal care items such as shampoo, toothpaste and brushes, deodorant, shaving cream and razors.

The youth will also be knocking on doors

collecting food that isn't put out, as well as monetary donations. Those who provide monetary donations of \$10 or more, along with their address, will be mailed a tax receipt.

Volunteers are needed, including those who are capable of lifting boxes of food, to help sort and box food at the Alliance Church, 290 Main St. S. after 9 a.m.

Anyone who misses the food pickup can drop their food off at the donation boxes in Loblaws, Food Basics or A&P. Donations can also be dropped off at the Bread Basket, 55 Sinclair Ave. Unit 12, on Wednesday or Saturday between 9 a.m. and noon.
