



## Remembrance Day: In the words of the children

In May of this year, 60 children and 30 adults from the George-Ltown Children's Chorus visited Holland to participate in Remembrance services at the Canadian War Cemetery in Holten, and to participate in the 60th anniversaryof the liberation of Holland by Canadian troops.

The choir travelled throughout Holland and sang in eight concerts. The highlights of their trip included a visit to the Holten Canadian War Cemetery, a silent Remembrance walk in Ermelo, a Liberation Day military parade in Nijkerk and marching in the veterans' parade in Apeldoorn.

The following are comments from the children about their trip:

At Holten, I had a feeling of sadness overcome me, because it is so hard to imagine the pain and the suffering that every soldier had to endure, as well as the Dutch people and many families all over the world. It was an honour to be at such a moving ceremony and place. This trip showed me how lucky I am to live in Canada, and how lucky we were and are to have the veterans who sacrificed their lives for Holland and for Canada.

The messages on the gravestones really broke my heart. The ages of some of the soldiers were so young. It was unbearable to think about family and friends of mine that are the same age as some of those men were. I regretted\_having to leave so soon.
