Surviving that one, I figured after moving my bedroom furniture in, I'd just spruce up my former bedroom, soon to become the den.


It had been wallpapered, and was long overdue for some decorating. I measured the walls and checked out wallpaper available.

Well... 'it does look just like #%&!.'

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
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
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
