Trio facing several drug charges after officers pull over vehicle

Three people are facing drug charges after Halton Police stopped a vehicle for a traffic violation in the Tanners Drive and Hwy. 7 area Friday afternoon.

Police report after pulling over the vehicle a female passenger left the scene and the male driver falsely identified himself, but was quickly identified by police.

Police say the man was found to be in possession of several different drugs.

Charged with possession of cocaine for the purpose of trafficking, possession of psilocybin (magic mushrooms), possession of crack cocaine, possession of property obtained by crime and obstruct police is Robert Barnard, 50, of Battleford Rd., Mississauga.

Police later located the woman passenger in a Queen St. Acton apartment, and she is also facing several charges.

Charged with possession of cocaine for the purpose of trafficking, possession of psilocybin (magic mushrooms), possession of crack cocaine, possession of marijuana, possession of morphine, possession of proceeds of crime, possession of stolen identification and three counts of breach of recognizance is Tania Brown, 32, of no fixed address.

A small number of marijuana plants were found growing in the apartment, police say.

Charged with producing a controlled substance is Larry Steadman, 43, of Queen St., Acton.
