THE CANADIAN CANCER SOCIETY envisions a world where no Canadian has to fear the disease

In Canada, it's estimated that cancer was diagnosed in about 153,100 new cases, and led to some 70,400 deaths, in 2006. Cancer is a disease that takes root in our cells. Usually, our cells follow the instructions they're given and we remain healthy. Sometimes, these instructions become confused, and a cell behaves abnormally. After a while, groups of these abnormal cells can start circulating in the blood or immune system, which can result in the appearance of cancer.

The Canadian Cancer Society was formed in 1938, with a goal to eliminate this disease and improve the quality of life for those affected by it. The Society's vision is to create a world where no Canadian has to fear cancer. To do this, the focus has been directed to five areas: research, maintaining public interest, prevention, information and support. Among other things for 2006-2007, the Canadian Cancer Society has distributed more than \$47 million for state of the art research projects taking place throughout the country.

It's thanks to the generosity of donors and to the supportive work of volunteers and employees that the Canadian Cancer Society can actively work to prevent, beat or control cancer. It takes its role as manager of these donations very much to heart, and expends all possible efforts to direct these dollars where they will do the most good in the fight against cancer.

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ALS SOCIETY



ALS stands for Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis, sometimes called Lou Gehrig's disease. It is a rapidly progressive and fatal neuromuscular disease that is characterized by degeneration of a select group of nerve cells and pathways (motor neurons) in the brain and spinal cord. This loss of motor neurons leads to progressive paralysis of the voluntary muscles. There is no known cure at this time and very little in the way of treatment that will have an effect on the disease itself. However, there is much that the health care community does to ensure quality of life care for the person with ALS. At the moment, there is a drug trial being conducted that may prolong life minimally. Research is looking to find not only the cause of the disease so that a cure can be developed but also other medications or treatments that can help until a cure is found. With improved knowledge about ALS, healthcare providers and families can help people living with ALS live life more fully.
