Halton Region Tree By-law helps preserve our woodlands

Halton Region recognises the important role that private owners serve as stewards of our woodlands as much of the forested land in southern Ontario is in private ownership.

The Halton Tree By-law, based on Good Forestry Practices, was passed by Regional Council and became effective January 1, 2006. The By-law regulates Woodlands 0.5 hectares (1.2 acres) and larger as well as Regional Greenlands as determined by the Halton Region Official Plan. Halton Region now has a Regional Forester who is available to assist any landowner to determine whether a treed area on his/her property is regulated by the By-law (see contact information below).

This By-law is complemented by a stewardship program to assist landowners with management of their forested properties. One element of this program is annual workshops on Forest Management, details of which are in this ad.

Public invited to woodlot workshop

Halton residents who own woodlots are invited to a Forest Management workshop on Tuesday, March 20, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Halton Region Museum (Hearth Room), 5181 Kelso Road, Milton.

In the morning there will be a presentation on hardwood forest management. In the afternoon there will be a tour of a harvested lot.

There is no cost. Interested participants must register in advance by mail, telephone or e-mail or fax by March 14. Lunch is included in the workshop.

In order to help protect and nurture woodland resources, the Halton Tree By-law was passed by Regional Council and became effective January 1, 2006. The Halton Tree By-law regulates woodlands 0.5 hectares (1.2 acres) and larger as well as Regional Greenlands as determined by the Halton Region Official Plan. Residents who are not sure if their property or if a treed area qualifies as woodland under the Halton Tree By-law may call Halton Region's Forestry staff.

The Provincial Places to Grow Plan – Is This Fair for Halton?

Halton Regional Council has adopted a resolution to advise the Province that Halton and its Local Municipalities cannot accommodate the growth targets specified in the provincial Places to Grow Plan, unless the Province provides Halton with the necessary financial tools and Provincial funding commitments. The Provincial Places to Grow Plan requires Halton to grow its population by 68% over the next 25 years, requiring \$8.6 billion in infrastructure.
