

# Ensure your children ride safely

With summer officially here this is likely a good time to remind you that for children ages 1 to 9 years motor vehicle collisions are the leading cause of death and/or injury.

In fatal crashes, nearly 20 per cent of children who were under the age of eight were not wearing a seat-belt, or restrained in a child safety seat or booster seat. A correctly used car seat will reduce the likelihood of death or injury by 75 per cent.

Here are some common mistakes:

- Seat-belt not tight enough to secure seat properly.
- Harness and shoulder straps are too loose or twisted.
- Chest clip is too low.
- Child safety seat is not appropriate for weight and height of child.
- Tether strap is not used for forward facing seats, or clipped to cargo anchors as opposed to proper tether anchors.
- Seat belt locking clip is not used when required (Review vehicle and seat manuals).
- Children under 12 years of age are in the front seat. The safest and best practice is to keep your child under 12 in the back seat, away from any active air bag.

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### NEW REQUIREMENTS FOR LIVESTOCK PRODUCERS

**On July 12, 2007, new rules come into effect to help eliminate bovine spongiform encephalopathy (BSE), or mad cow disease, from Canada.**

- All animal feed must be free of certain cattle tissues capable of transmitting BSE, known as specified risk material (SRM).
- Permits issued by the Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) must be obtained to transport or dispose of cattle carcasses off a producer's property.

Action starts now. The CFIA encourages livestock producers to use up all existing on-farm supplies of feed, and to ensure that all new feed purchases are SRM-free.

Producers should also contact the CFIA for additional information on movement and disposal requirements.


