

Dishonesty insurance policy renewed by Town

The Town of Halton Hills has renewed its Comprehensive Dishonesty, Disappearance & Destruction insurance policy for 2008. The policy provides blanket coverage of \$1 million for employee dishonesty and \$100,000 loss of money. There is a terrorism exclusion clause. The premium is \$6,460/year.

Fire crew commended for effort

On March 5 at 5:30 a.m., I was awakened by a telephone call. When one gets a telephone call in the early morning hours, it usually is not good news.

It was our Town CAO, Dennis Perlin, calling to advise me that "Mr. Mayor, we have had a train derailment in Halton Hills. There were no injuries, and our firefighters and CN officials are at the scene and have everything under control."

I looked out my window and could hardly see across the street as it was snowing and blowing.

I viewed the wreckage later that day. It was an amazing site to see 20 rail cars heaped into a pile, many crumpled in disrepair. You should know that we have a top-notch fire department— from our first responders, Captains Woods and Wilson, to Fire Safety Specialist Bruno Martina.

Later, a CN official expressed gratitude to our fire department as they had arrived at the scene during a raging blizzard, had assessed and understood the situation, and above all, didn't panic. CN officials were also complimentary of our Fire Chief Brent Marshall. I have to also mention Deputy Chief Harry Olivieri for quarterbacking the overall response, as well as Laurel in communications.

CN did a terrific clean-up as the GO trains were up and running the very next day. I was assured that the site will be in a better condition than it was previous to the derailment.

This was the first derailment of any major consequence in Halton Hills and it is fair to say that our fire department came through with flying colours.

SECOND HAND SMOKE INCREASES EAR INFECTIONS IN CHILDREN

Ear infections are the Number One reason young children visit their doctors and take antibiotics. A new study finds many of those infections could be avoided if parents who smoke would make one important change.

A recent study in the archives of pediatric and adolescent medicine is giving parents another reason to quit. It finds exposure to cigarette smoke in the home increases children's risk of middle ear infections. The smoke inflames the tissues of the middle ear so that viruses and bacteria can invade more easily and cause infection.


