## Cash boost for speedskaters

The sport of speedskating in the North Halton region received a boost earlier this month when the Ontario Trillium Foundation presented the four-year-old organization with a \$15,000 grant.

Several of the Milton Speedskating Club members are from the Halton Hills area and membership has doubled in size in each of the last three years since its founding. The club plans to purchase 35 pairs of long-bladed new generation skates with the grant money in order to accommodate the expected growth in membership.

"So far, we've had to rely a lot on hand-me-

down equipment from other more established clubs, which we are grateful for of course, but it will be really nice for North Halton kids to have access to new state of the art speed skates," said club president Tony Geng.

"We are looking forward to see a lot of new personal bests and club records set this coming season."

The volunteer-run club introduces youths to the sport with a four-week Learn to Speedskate programs, as well as weekly lessons for intermediate and advanced skaters.

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## Blue Box Tips

### Squish It!

**Before putting containers in your Blue Box – give them a squish!**

Squish your aluminum pop cans, plastic pop and water bottles, beverage cartons and Tetra Paks.

Not only will squishing save space in your Blue Box for more items, but it will help collection because space will be used effectively inside the truck.

### Flatten It!

**Before putting boxboard in your Blue Box – flatten it!**

By flattening boxboard, you help prevent litter, save space in your Blue Box for more materials, and save space inside the collection truck.

### Tie It!

**Before putting corrugated cardboard in your Blue Box – tie it up!**

Tie corrugated cardboard in bundles no larger than 90 cm x 90 cm x 30 cm (3 ft x 3 ft x 1 ft) and place beside your Blue Box.

Not only will tying corrugated cardboard prevent litter, but it will help speed up collection because collectors can more easily pick up the tied cardboard.



## Plastic bags don't go in the Blue Box

Don't put plastic shopping bags in the Blue Box. Plastic bags get caught in the sorting facility's machinery and conveyor belts slowing downing the recycling process, or they get static-clung to glass leading to contamination.

Instead, take plastic shopping bags back to local retailers to be recycled. Visit [www.halton.ca/takeitback](http://www.halton.ca/takeitback) for a list of stores that take back plastic shopping bags. Take It Back! Halton partners easily recycle plastic shopping bags into more bags or into plastic lumber because the bags don't have to be sorted and are not contaminated from other materials.

Don't put Blue Box material in clear or blue plastic bags because it only creates additional waste (the bag is ripped open and the bag goes to landfill).
