NOTICE OF STUDY COMMENCEMENT

GEORGETOWN WATER STORAGE CLASS ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENT STUDY PR-2424A

Study

Halton Region is initiating a Class Environmental Assessment (Class EA) study to address water storage upgrades, replacement and/or expansion requirements to meet current needs of existing customers and accommodate planned growth within the existing urban boundary of Georgetown and the Hamlets of Stewarttown, Glen Williams and Norval. The Georgetown Municipal Water Supply System currently consists of groundwater sources from three well fields. The existing distribution system comprises approximately 177 km of watermain and three (3) separate water storage facilities that include: the Todd Road Elevated Water Tower, the 22nd Side Road In-ground Reservoir and the Norval Standpipe.

Previous water storage studies completed for Georgetown have identified the need to upgrade existing storage facilities and to provide additional water storage in order to meet current needs and support future growth. A detailed inspection of the Todd Road Elevated Water Tower completed in 2004, identified that the tower was generally in good condition and that the Region could continue with operation of the facility. However, the inspection did identify a number of deficiencies that need to be resolved in order for the water tower to comply with current safety standards and codes. Additionally, it was established that site improvements, functional and operational upgrades to the Todd Road Elevated Water Tower were required to maintain or improve the level of service to the existing serviced area.

The need to upgrade, replace and/or expand the existing water storage facilities in Georgetown has provided the Region with the opportunity to engage in a system-wide approach to assessing water storage and distribution requirements in Georgetown, based on existing consumption trends and planned growth within the existing urban boundary.

Process

This Class EA study will address water storage and distribution requirements, a hydraulic evaluation of the existing distribution system, and alternative options for upgrading, replacing and/or expanding the existing storage facilities.

The Class EA study is being planned under Schedule B of the Municipal Class Environmental Assessment process (October 2000 as amended in 2007) and will satisfy Phases 1 and 2 of the planning process. This Class EA study will include public and review agency consultation, evaluation of water storage alternatives, assessment of the impacts of the proposed works and identification of measures to mitigate any adverse impacts. Upon completion of the study, a Project File Report documenting the planning and decision making process followed during the study will be prepared and made available for a 30-day public review period. A separate advertisement will be issued to advise of the completion of the Class EA study and the locations where the Project File Report will be available for review.

One (1) Public Information Centre (PIC) has been planned as part of this Class EA study. The PIC is tentatively scheduled for September 2008. Background information of the study, the alternative solutions considered during the process, the evaluation methodology used to evaluate the alternatives, and the preliminary preferred solution will be provided at the PIC. Staff from the Region and the consulting firm (UMA Engineering Ltd.) will be present to answer questions and discuss the next steps in the process. Notification of the PIC will be advertised and posted on the Region's website at www.halton.ca.
