GEORGETOWN WATER STORAGE CLASS ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENT STUDY GEORGETOWN PR-2424

Halton Region is completing a Class Environmental Assessment (EA) Study to address water storage requirements within the existing urban boundary of Georgetown and the Hamlets of Stewarttown, Glen Williams and Norval.

This Class EA study is undertaking a system-wide approach to assessing water storage and distribution requirements in Georgetown in order to meet the needs of existing customers and accommodate planned growth within the urban boundary. Alternative solutions will be evaluated to select the most technically feasible and environmentally sound alternative for water storage in Georgetown and will include upgrades, replacement and/or expansion requirements affecting the Todd Road Elevated Water Tower and/or the 22nd Side Road Inground Reservoir.

The Georgetown Water Storage Class EA Study is being completed as a Schedule B project in accordance with the procedures and requirements defined in the Municipal Class Environmental Assessment Process (2000 as amended in 2007).

Public and review agency consultation is a key element of the Class EA process, and input will be sought from interested parties throughout this study. Upon completion of the study, a comprehensive Class EA Project File Report will be prepared to document the planning and decision making process followed during the EA study. A separate notice will be issued at that stage.

The Region wants to ensure that anyone interested in the study has an opportunity to get involved and provide input before any decisions are made on a preferred solution. You are invited to attend a Public Information Centre to review the alternative solutions considered for this study, the evaluation methodology used to assess the alternatives, and the preliminary preferred solution. Representatives from Halton Region and their consultants, UMA Engineering Ltd. will be available to discuss any comments or concerns you may have.

This Public Information Centre will be an informal meeting and you are invited to drop in at your convenience between the noted hours.
