Looking to put some icing on what's been an excellent 2007 season for Georgetown's Mary Ann Lapointe, the recent Canadian Golf Hall of Fame inductee was eliminated from the recent U.S. Women's Mid-Amateur Championship in the first round of match play.

Lapointe completed the 36 holes of stroke play in a tie for 14th spot with rounds of 81 and 75 to qualify for the match play bracket of 64 players. She was edged out in her first match by Lecia of Alexander of Texas 1 up.

In 2005, Lapointe became the first non-American to win that title.
