# Parade-goers encouraged to bring Santa letters and unwrapped toys

As in the past, area children are encouraged to bring their letters to Santa Claus to the parade, as Canada Post letter carriers will be walking the route collecting them.

The letters should be addressed to Santa Claus, North Pole, HOH OHO, Canada. Children should include a complete return address so Santa can respond. Santa can also receive email through [www.canadapost.ca/santascorner](http://www.canadapost.ca/santascorner).

Also this year, area residents are asked to bring a new, unwrapped toy to the parade.

The Georgetown Firefighters Association, in conjunction with SickKids Foundation, will be collecting the toys at the parade in one of the Halton Hills Fire Protection and Prevention Services' new support trucks. All the toys will be distributed to children who are in the Hospital for Sick Children. All local kids under the care of Sick Kids will be the first recipients of gifts collected before they are distributed to children who live outside of the community.

"This is a special time of year that children look forward to everything that Christmas is supposed to be and spending that time in hospital can be quite traumatic," said Georgetown Firefighters Association chairman Ron Appleyard. "Our firefighters want to help in making their stay somewhat more enjoyable."

Appleyard said filling one truck with toys would be "great," filling another one would be "absolutely super."

Toys can also be dropped in a bin outside the main entrance door at the Georgetown Fire Department's headquarters at 53 Maple Ave. beginning tomorrow (Thursday).

Parade Chairman and Lions Club member Al Watt said the parade costs about \$8,000 each year to put on and with the financial support from sponsors including Georgetown Market Place,

Cooper Standard Products, Fraser Direct, Carpet Barn Carpet One and Georgetown Chrysler Jeep it helps the Lions Club put on a quality event, but Watt added, donations from businesses and individuals don't cover the cost of the parade.

However, Watt stressed the Lions Club does not solicit donations along the parade route, and those who have collected money at the parade are not members of the Lions Club. Watt said the club doesn't support such a practice.

## Police blotter 'Racist' graffiti found

Halton Police are investigating incidents of racist graffiti spray-painted at two residential properties in the rural area last week.

Police say graffiti was discovered early Friday spray painted with white paint on a dump truck parked at a Fourth Line home.

Early Saturday morning a Five Sideroad homeowner found racist graffiti including the words "White Power" and a swastika spray-painted on an exterior wall of the house.

Police do not believe the graffiti was targeted at the residents of the properties.

Halton Regional Police Detective Sgt. Murray Drinkwalter says the graffiti "obviously causes us concern because of the content and the racist tone."

Police ask anyone who knows who is responsible for the graffiti to contact the One District Street Crime Unit at 905-878-5511 ext. 2110.
