James Gordon musical starts museum fundraising

The Halton Museum Foundation is kicking off its 2007 fundraising campaign with a special presentation of James Gordon's musical, "Hardscrabble Road," at the John Elliott Theatre in Georgetown on Saturday, January 20.

Gordon, a native of Rockwood, now living in Guelph, has made a name for himself with songs and musicals describing the lives of ordinary people.

"Hardscrabble Road" is described as a gritty, thoughtprovoking tale that takes the audience on a journey to the back streets of a Canadian inner city where a group of homeless people sing of their plight. Gordon's most ambitious work to date with 24 all-new songs, the musical uses sharp satire, humour and a wide range of music styles to convey the message of how our current global situation can have a personal impact on each and everyone.

Gordon shares the lead vocals with a "who's who" of the area's music scene, including Ken Browne, Nonie Crete, Sandy Horne, Amy Nodwell and Ryan Schneider. These performers are backed-up by instrumentalists Lois Cherry, Marion Linton, Even Gordon and Randall Coryell.

Council sworn in December 6

Members of Halton Regional Council were sworn in for the 2006-2010 term of office at an inaugural ceremony at the Regional Centre in Oakville on Wednesday, Dec. 6.

The Honourable Mr. Justice Michael Quigley presided over the Declarations of Office. The invocation was delivered by Archbishop John Bothwell and representatives of Halton's interfaith community including representatives from the Halton Islamic Association, Metis Women's Circle and Aboriginal Community, Al-Falah Islamic Centre. Halton Sikh Cultural Association, Shaarei-Beth El Congregation, and Vaishnu Devi Hindu Temple of Oakville.

In his inaugural address, Regional Chairman Gary Carr congratulated the mayors and regional councillors on their election, and commented on the importance of listening to and respecting each other's opinions. Chairman Carr also touched on themes of Halton's growth, the Energy from Waste business case and Ontario Municipal Board reform. He emphasized that public consultation is key to ensuring the best outcomes for Halton and its residents. The 2006-2010 Council
