Continued from page 1 surplus, there would be a tax savings this year, but cautioned they would have to find that same amount for next year's budget, just to remain level. He also said that in a bad winter, they could exceed the budget.

DeSouza said that they carry over an opening balance of \$325,000, subtracted from the surplus, each year. He said this year's surplus would be "small", less than

\$175,000 once the opening balance is removed.

O'Leary did not make a formal motion and no action was taken on thew snow plowging budget surplus.

Rookie Georgetown Councillor John Duncan attempted to cut the hiring of two full-time firefighters from the fire department budget budget, but his motion lost on a 6-4 vote.

An earlier council voted



to hire four full-time firefighters each year until the department is up to fulltime strength, in 20 to 25 vears.

Duncan said they all want a safe community, but with a .9 per cent increase in call volume, he can't support a 14.4 per cent fire budget increase and only hiring two firefighters this year would save \$273,000.

Mayor Rick Bonnette, noting that fire safety was the top issue in a public survey, voted against cutting the fire budget "even though it (the budget in-
