Youth explain work of POSSE to local politicians

What do people see when two young people approach a group of youths hanging out at a local hot spot? Just another gathering of wayward youth with uncertain intentions? Or the first step in peer outreach and a connection that may put at-risk youth in touch with services they badly need?

The first perception may be the most common one, but the local youth agency that sends those young outreach workers into the community to connect with other youths is hoping to turn that around.

In a move in that direction, Peer Outreach Support Services and Education (POSSE) recently held an informal get-together with youth, staff and volunteers and invited members of Town Council to attend to learn more about the group's work from the young people themselves.

It was a very candid discussion at the first-ever meeting between politicians - Councillor Bryan Lewis and Mayor Rick Bonnette – and members of this youth-driven project. The invited guests listened intently as the youths talked about some of the challenges they've faced in their own lives, the value of the work they do with POSSE, and its role in giving their lives a focus.

In the past two years, POSSE Project has trained 124 youths, its outreach workers have connected with 4,207 youth on the street, and offered support to 458 youths on issues ranging from homelessness to substance use and assault.

POSSE, which is currently into the third year of a three-year grant from the Trillium Foundation,

is a free service providing training, street level outreach, information and support to youth in North Halton, with a mandate to encourage safer decision making to reduce the risks associated with drug use, sex, homelessness, violence and discrimination.

Other POSSE services include:

·Youth are trained in a wide variety of areas, including how to defuse violent situations, sexual health, confidentiality and legal responsibilities, anti-racism and anti-homophobia, and reducing harm associated with substance use, among others:

•Transportation is provided to young people age 15 to 24 to food banks, court or medical appointments,

shelters, etc.;

•Emergency kits are distributed containing food vouchers, phone cards, and hygiene bags;

•The production of a youth-run magazine, "The Undercroft – where minds meet," with a focus on harm reduction and human rights issues, gives young people a forum to express themselves through art or writing (contributors receive an honorarium for published

POSSE is a harm reduction and human rights project run by youth for youth between the ages of 15-24, living in North



Halton Region delivers safe and high quality drinking water to its commercial, institutional and residential customers. Providing clean, safe drinking water is an important responsibility, and Halton is a leader in water purification technology. Halton Regional Council approved the Cross-Connection Control By-Law #157-05 and the related policy, that came into effect January 1, 2006.

Cross connection control or backflow prevention, helps to ensure that the drinking water supply is protected against the entry of contaminants, pollutants, infectious agents or other materials and substances that may enter from outside sources.

Halton Region is hosting a series of Public Information Centres to provide industrial, commercial and institutional property owners and residents with information on Cross Connection and the steps you can take to prevent contamination of our drinking water supply.
