

Letters Pooling funds should be returned to taxpayers

In 1998 the Province began a program known as GTA Pooling. GTA regional municipalities became tax collectors for the Province who sent the money on to Toronto where it was used for Toronto's welfare and social programs.

The Halton pooling budget for 2007 is \$41 million or \$182 per Halton household.

Halton Region Councillors have complained that GTA Pooling is not fair to Halton taxpayers. They claimed that social pro-

grams should not be funded from municipal taxes. They also claimed that Halton taxpayers should not be sending municipal taxes out of the Region. The councillors were right!

Now the Province has agreed to phase out GTA Pooling and the Region is trying to avoid returning the money to taxpayers. The Region would like to "return the money in increased services" - whether we want them or not! Whether we can afford them or not!
