On average, Halton Region has been sending approximately \$42 million dollars, and every year it will be a further reduction until it is eliminated. The only reason why I am not totally jumping for joy is that Pooling won't be completely phased out until 2013. To me, it would have made more sense to have it eliminated in the next four vear term of the Provincial Government.




