

Catholic Board mourns loss of former director C. Byrnes

second director of education of the Halton Catholic District School Board on Friday, Feb. 1, created a "profound sense of loss and respect" among members of the present Catholic board.

Byrnes assumed the position of director of education at the Halton Catholic District School Board on August 1, 1971 two years after the four municipal separate school boards (Burlington, Oakville, Milton and Georgetown) in Halton amalgamated to form Halton Regional Roman Catholic

The death of Clifford G. Byrnes, the Separate School Board in 1969. Having served the Board for 23 years as its director, he retired on August 31, 1994.

"Cliff Byrnes was a respected leader and advocate of Catholic education not only in Halton but throughout Ontario.
