Car - tractor collision

A collision between a car and a tractor on the Guelph Line, just north of 20 Side Road at about 6:10 p.m. on Thursday, June 12 resulted in charges of careless driving against the 23-year-old Lakefield, Ont. man driving the car.

Halton Police said a 2002 Pontiac Sunfire was travelling north on the Guelph Line, passing several vehicles going in the same direction. The Pontiac was executing one such passing sequence at the crest of a hill when it met a pick-up truck travelling in the southbound lane. The car veered into the northbound lane, colliding into the rear of a large farm tractor which displayed a slow moving vehicle sign and had amber and red flashing lights.

The Pontiac driver was taken to Milton Hospital for laceration treatment. The tractor driver was not injured.

Police said alcohol and speed were factors in the collision.

Halton Region is proposing cast iron watermain replacements on the following streets:

- Mill Street East from Young Street to Acton Boulevard

- Peel Street from Young Street to Wellington Street
- Perth Street from CN Tracks to Wallace Street

In conjunction with the watermain replacements, sanitary sewers will also be replaced on the following streets:

- Mill Street East from Wellington Street to Acton Boulevard
- Peel Street from Young Street to Wellington Street
- Perth Street from CN Tracks to Wallace Street

The Town of Halton Hills is also proposing road and storm sewer construction along with curb and sidewalk repair/installation on the following streets:

- Acton Boulevard from Mill Street to Queen Street
- Mill Street East from Wellington Street to Acton Boulevard
- Peel Street from Young Street to Wellington Street
- Perth Street from CN Tracks to Wallace Street

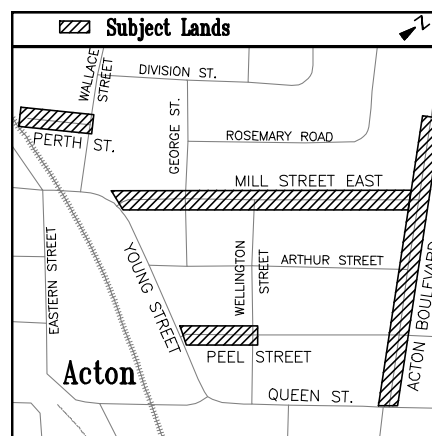
