up and that she was opposed to it, giving (the decision) a chance to be changed," Somerville said.

Somerville also questioned an earlier comment from Acton trustee Garry Ockenden, who voted in favour of listing part of the MSB site as surplus, that there might be provincial cash for the Town to use to buy the land.

Town," Somerville said.

On Tuesday, Ockenden said he was under the impression that there was some provincial money available, but added, "if there isn't, then there isn't" adding he would talk with Board staff to clarify the issue.

Ockenden said he's received approximately 100 e-mails – he is trying to answer every one – about the proposed MSB land sale, all of them in opposition to the plan.

"People are upset. It's an emotional situation and I'll just deal with it as it goes," Ockenden said.

When asked if the Board might reconsider it's decision Ockenden said, "To be honest I can't say, but the Board definitely has to listen to the community when they speak and I'm sure the community will be delegating the Board at some point in time."

The 15.4-acre MSB, site is larger than the average school site of between six and seven acres and the Ministry of Education has instructed school boards to sell off surplus property in order to be eligible for money for new schools. The

Halton Board has not determined yet how much of the MSB site might be severed and sold. The MSB site is one of eight properties that the Board deemed surplus at


