The sudden announcement that the Reverend Canon Mark Tiller was resigning from St. Alban's the Martyr Anglican Church "shocked" the congregation when they heard the news during church services last Sunday.

Cannon Tiller, wellloved and respected by church members, had been at St. Alban's for 15 years. Easter Sunday will be his last day at St. Alban's, and he will take over as Rector of Grace Church in Waterdown in May after a two-week break. He will continue to reside in Rockwood.

St. Alban's congregate and Anglican Sinnot Council member Cindy Blades said people were shocked and dismayed by Canon Tiller's decision to

leave Acton.

"He is a people person and so easy to talk to,' Blades said on Tuesday.

"He is someone that you can go to with suggestions for services and he is always very accommodating and easy going. His manner made him very approachable and very easy to deal with – he is very popular and we will miss him very much."

Cannon Tiller, the Dean of the Greater Wellington Region, is well known for his theatrical skills which are an asset as he communicates his biblical knowledge to others. Currently, Canon Tiller presents the role of St. Paul in solo performances of 1st Corinthians throughout Ontario.

He has directed a high school play in Acton, appeared in numerous performances with the Georgetown Little Theatre and is a regular performer with the Acton Town Hall Dinner Theatre Troupe.

Along with his duties at St. Alban's, Canon Tiller is the Padre for the Royal Canadian Legion in Acton and a member of the Acton Ministerial Association.

Feds double gas funds Town gets \$1.5 million

Families in Acton and Georgetown will soon see faster improvements to roads and other local infrastructure thanks to the government's doubling of gas tax transfers to municipalities, Wellington-Halton Hills MP Michael Chong announced on Tuesday.

"Our government is doubling to \$1,565,649 the annual funding that Halton Hills receives from Gas Tax Fund and is making the money available almost three months earlier," said Chong. "This is part of an increased investment from gas taxes of about \$1 billion for municipalities in Ontario this year.

This latest announcement builds on the Conservative government's previous action of making the gas tax transfers to municipalities permanent. This year's doubling of the gas transfers will help Halton Hills maintain local infrastructure. Like roads, bridges and water treatments



At 5:30 p.m. the congregation will join the Procession of the Cross from Churchill Community Church through Acton to Bethel.


On Saturday at St. Joseph's there will be the Blessing of the Basket at 10 a.m., and a Vigil Mass at 8 p.m.
