New minister at Trinity plans to stay 'long time'

Acton's Trinity United Church is not just a shortterm posting for its new minister, the Reverend Hyuk Cho who delivered his first sermon two weeks ago. Cho said he and his family – wife Junghee Park, who is also a minister, and their two children – plan to stay for "a long time."

Trinity had been without a permanent minister for at least five years, and Cho said he came to Acton to make long-term meaningful relationships and help Trinity grow to its potential.

Cho's last posting was near Tillsonburg in southwestern Ontario where he served the Brownsville and Delmer United Churches for eight years. He is also in the midst of studying for his theology doctorate at the University of Toronto.

Cho said he saw the posting for the position in Acton in the United church magazine and determined it would be perfect for his family – close enough to

Toronto so he and his wife could continue their studies, but still enjoy rural town life and ministry with good schools for his children.

Cho said his immediate goals are to meet all of the members of the congregation and determine their needs and learn "what is at stake" in the church.

"They are looking for someone who will stay for something like 10 years. The congregation needs pastoral care and I hope that we can offer many programs for children," Cho said on Friday, adding that the dedicated Sunday School teacher is "almost burned out."

Cho said his priorities are to get to know each and every church member to learn what they and church needs, and he hopes to develop the Sunday School program and develop a collective vision for the church.

Cho's first sermon dealt with building a welcoming community and how to build a church that they all can call home. Reflecting on the gospel in Mark, Cho said that they deserve to build their faith community together regardless of who they are, because God is interested in who we are becoming.

"Thus I am here to build a welcoming community with you. We are here humbly to work to build a welcoming home for all people...I know we can build this welcoming community because you have already welcomed our family into your midst." Cho said.
