- 3. The choice is yours. Whether you choose to sign a contract or not, we will continue to deliver your electricity.
- 4. **Compare** the contract price to other offers and to historical prices; visit the Ontario Energy Board ("OEB") website at <u>www.energychoiceontario.ca</u>. Be aware that electricity contracts only affect the "Electricity Charges" portion of your bill.
- Before you Sign: Do your research. Make sure you understand what you are signing. Visit the Ontario Energy Board ("OEB") website at www.energychoiceontario.ca to compare prices and find out more information about contracts, cancellation penalties and other charges that may apply.
- You must reaffirm your contract for it to be valid. All electricity contracts have a 10-day "cooling-off" period.



Halton prepared for flu

Halton Medical Officer of Heath, Dr. Bob Nosal, has made a presentation to the Health and Social Services Committee recently. Key message regarding the flue season was that this year it's different. The H1N1 flu virus

Halton Medical Officer of eath, Dr. Bob Nosal, has ade a presentation to the ealth and Social Services is expected to be circulating in the community in addition to the seasonal flu virus that circulates every year.

"We are taking this issue very seriously," said Halton Region Chair, Gary Carr. "Health Department staff are



working closely with community partners such as the school boards, hospitals and municipalities as well as the provincial and the federal governments."

Practising proper infection control remains the most effective method of preventing illness. This includes washing your hands frequently with soap and water or using an alcohol-based hand sanitizer, coughing or sneezing into your sleeve, keeping commonly touched surfaces clean and disinfected, and staying home from work or school when you are sick.

"This year, it truly is a different flu season. Extensive planning has occurred over the past few months to prepare for the anticipated second wave of H1N1 flu," said Dr. Bob Nosal. "Currently we are also planning for mass immunization clinics for H1N1 flu, in addition to clinics for seasonal flu. We are also working with hospitals and primary care providers as they develop contingency plans for flu centres.'
