Market wants to expand

Wellington Country Market on Jones Baseline has applied for a zoning amendment in order to add parking and floor space.

Owners Bill Ross and Brenda Maziarz-Ross want permission to expand the retail area from 700 sq. ft. to 1120 sq. ft, increase the number of employees, add nine customer and seven staff parking spaces for a total of 29, add a separate entrance onto Jones Baseline for the existing residence, and renovate the meat processing facility to comply with recent changes to food safety regulations.

The market is a family owned business

located on prime agricultural land and requires a zoning by-law amendment to establish the "farm produce outlet." They do not propose to change the use, but rather to expand on it. The market is considered to have a relationship to the surrounding agricultural area by selling local farm products and by offering an "agricultural destination" with its petting zoo of bunnies, miniature donkeys, ponies and a pot bellied pig.

Council agreed to move forward with the application and will hold a public meeting, in which neighbours will have the opportunity to express concerns or support.
