When a warm family scene filled with a giant Christmas tree and people enjoying hot chocolate and good cheer popped into Gerry Kentner's consciousness two years ago, little did the former Acton resident know that she was starting a tradition that would spread throughout Halton Hills.

On Thursday morning, Kentner and her Light Up The Hills committee supervised the planting of a 25-foot Colorado Blue Spruce – the Tree of Hope – near the Acton arena/ community centre. It night two years ago. will be festooned with hundreds of lights next year as part of an annual seasonal light festival.

Last year, the first tree was planted and decorated in Dominion Gardens Park with over 50,000 energy-friendly LED lights in a celebration that brought 1,500 people to the park.

"We have a threeyear expansion plan," said Light Up The Hills chair Gerry Kentner adding she hasn't had any other "visions" like the one that sparked the light event idea as she was driving by a toboggan hill one wintry

The humble plan – which garnered both the Civic Pride and Business of the Year awards – has grown and within a number of years Kentner hopes to have donated trees planted and decorated in all of Halton Hills' hamlets each December 1.

"Last year, the event showed that we are a small town community. We had families and friends come to the tree lighting and next year,

the Acton tree will be lighted. We are adding new displays in Georgetown and the walks will be cleared so people can enjoy the park," Kentner said on Thursday after the planting in Acton.

In a press release, Kentner said the first phase of expansion would concentrate on raising funds and awareness in Acton so that the light displays can be installed for December 2010.
