Town honours athletes and an actress

A World-calibre Masters soccer player and a budding actress, both from Acton, were among the recipients of Municipal Awards at a ceremony on Monday in the council chambers in Georgetown.

The long-standing awards provide Halton Hills with an opportunity to recognize individuals and groups whose triumphs on the local, provincial, national and international stage, bring honour to the town.

Playing high level soccer is a stress buster for Acton's Christina Carere, who earned a podium finish at the World Masters Games in Sydney, Australia, this fall, playing for the Oakville Fury, an over-40 team of players from Ontario.

Competing against 31 of the best Masters players in the world, Carere, a centre defensive stopper, played six games in six days and made it into the quarter-finals seeded first.

At the Games, the Fury had a decisive 2-0 win in game seven, and in the semi-final they lost 2-1 in the last 30 seconds of the game moving them into the Bronze final the next day, which they lost 3-2 on penalty kicks.

Carere now plays for the four-team Acton Women's League and a co-ed team. She went into the games thinking it was a once in a lifetime opportunity, but since has received two invitations to the next World Games in Italy in 2013.

Acton's Carly Livingston, 12, is an award-winning confident actress/model who

won the Best Actress Award in the Young Cuts Film Festival for her lead role as Autumn in a short film called Scarecrow where she played a girl dying of leukemia. She has appeared in two music videos, appeared on television and many print ads. She has since also appeared in a documentary, on television and in many print ads as a model. She also appeared in Camp Rock 2 starring the Jonas Brothers.

Livingston won several awards at the Canadian Model and Talent Convention, which had over 500 contestants of all ages. She was awarded the Grand Overall Child Actor Award, first place for Monologue and TV Commercial and second runner-up for singing.

Livingston, a Grade 7 student at McKenzie-Smith Bennett School, began acting with the Georgetown Youth Theatre Group. She also studies singing with Rockwood music teacher Debbie Tilson and recently placed third in the Guelph Kiwanis Festival.

2009 World Canoe/Kayak Championships.


