Join the Challenge

As the mercury climbs and air conditioners are cranked up to try to beat the heat, it's a perfect time to think about, and act on, energy conservation measures.

It is relatively easy to reduce the amount of power you use – simple things like turning off unnecessary lights, unplugging TVs and DVDs to reduce the phantom load, and turning down, or off, air conditioners can result in substantial energy savings.

Again this year, the Town, in partnership with Halton Hills Hydro, the Chamber of Commerce and Practically Green Solutions, is making it easier to conserve by championing the Power Pledge Community Challenge. Last year, Halton Hills placed 10th of 83 participating Ontario municipalities in energy conservation.

This year, the Town is competing in two categories – the highest percentage drop in electricity use on August 11, and the highest per capita participation in the Power Pledge drive. Between now and August 11 – the Community Challenge Day – residents are asked to lower their energy use, avoid energy costs and reduce greenhouse gas emissions. Simple, yet effective.
