The most recent report of a suspicious man attempting to lure an Acton boy into a silver vehicle frustrated Halton police when it turned out to be a lie – a huge "fabrication" by a nine-year-old boy, possibly looking for attention.

He sure got it – on Friday, there were seven officers investigating four reports of a suspicious silver car/truck in Acton in the past month, and the tactical squad was in town – a police "presence" designed to quell fears.

Police stopped short of saying there was a "panic" because of the four reports – there's been no corroboration of the first three incidents – but said there was a 'heightened awareness" involving silver vehicles.

One officer said it was a "Catch-22" situation – they want people to report incidents, but don't want to waste time investigating kids who cry wolf.

While school officials continue to stress street proofing measures, let's hope they, and parents, talk to the kids about the dangers of lying, possibly using Aesop's Fable about the bored boy who falsely cried wolf who was not believed when there really was a wolf who ate him.

As the fable says, "Even when liars tell the truth, they are never believed. The liar will lie once, twice, and then perish when he tells the truth."
