## Town Digest

Parking changes

Confusion among Town staff and the parking bylaw enforcement officers should be clarified with new directions from the Town's Community Affairs committee, which are expected to be endorsed by council on June 14.

Ed DeSousa, the Town's director of Corporate Services, said the confusion stems from different levels of parking enforcement across the town. The Town's parking bylaw is enforced by an outside contracted service and in residential areas, tickets are issued only on a complaint basis.

Staff offered councillors three enforcement options including full enforcement of parking rules in all areas with no warnings; one warning per licence plate in all areas of the Town, and one warning per plate with specific exemptions including the downtown BIA areas, loading and unloading zones and specific streets.

Committee members en-

dorsed option two, which is different than the current practice, but would, according to staff, provide some consistency across Halton Hills. There would not be any warnings for people who illegally park in fire routes or accessible parking spaces.

DeSousa said option two would result in a revenue loss of up to \$80,000 in next year's budget.

Municipal assistance

Seven local non-profit groups and community organizations will benefit in \$32,670 – mostly in fee waivers and for delivery of equipment and marketing – if recommendations made by the Town's Community Affairs committee are ratified at council on Monday.

Only one request, from organizers of the annual Terry Fox Run in Georgetown to waive fees to use the Gellert Community Centre, was rejected because the criteria states that taxpayers' money should not go to charities.

The committee voted to

provide Municipal Assistance funding to:

• \$1,633 for the Glen Williams Town Hall Board for its Canada Day celebrations for a fee waiver, delivery of outdoor equipment and marketing

• \$1,223 for the Acton Firefighters Association to waive fees and to market its Canada Day celebrations

• \$3,858 for the Acton BIA for fee waivers, delivery of equipment and marketing for the Canada Day Concert in the Park and the Leathertown Festival

• \$7,500 for the Acton Medical Clinic to help defray the cost of a nurse practitioner

• \$12,000 to Links2Care in a partnership agreement, and

• \$500 for the Ballinafad Community Hall

At a future meeting, council will deal with a request for \$15,341 for tourism services and a \$7,800 request from the Willow Park Ecology steering committee.
