Upper Grand District School Board Trustee, Ralph Edwards has confirmed that this transportation funding is not guaranteed beyond June

A Certificate of Achievement and Letter of Recognition will form part of a Community Recognition Program in the Guelph/Eramosa Township. Chief Administrative Officer, Janice Sheppard put forward a draft proposal at a recent meeting of council, recommending the initiative be adopted to recognise individuals or groups who have made outstanding or innovative achievements in the community, representing a long-term commitment

to the Township.

The estimated cost to the Township for administration and supplies is minimal – consisting of approximately \$4 per certificate and five minutes of administrative effort.

Letters of Recognition may be awarded to individuals who are not eligible for the proposed Certificates of Achievement, but who have shown accomplishments worthy of recognition. The Township's Mayor at a regular meeting of council, in June or December, will recognise the worthy individuals or groups.

Nominations for the awards may be submitted to the Township by any individual, group or community organization in the municipality.

wood Conservation Area, where they're scheduled to stop for lunch, followed by their return trip to Mil-


