


Halton Crime Stoppers earns a top award

Representatives from 34 of the province's 38 Crime Stoppers programs attended the Windsor conference which wrapped up on Tuesday.

Halton Crime Stoppers is a non-profit community-based organization that was established in 1988 to take tips anonymously from anyone who has information about any unsolved crimes. There are more than 1,200 Crime Stoppers programs operating in more than 40 countries around the world.

Collectively they have solved more than 1.2 million cases; recovered almost \$2 billion in stolen property and provided information to police that has led to the seizure of drugs with a street value of more than \$9.9 billion. according to accumulative statistics compiled by Crime Stoppers International.
