Highway painting bid disqualified

A bid to paint highway lines submitted by a paving company with ties to a member of Guelph/Eramosa Township council was recently disqualified.

The Township's Manager of Public Works, Ken Gagnon, sought legal advice and determined that Niagara Crack Sealing's bid of \$8,000 was in contravention of a procurement bylaw, automatically disqualifying the company from the tender process. Gagnon recommended council

submitted by Metro Pavement Marking Ltd.

Last month, both companies were asked for references, and a list of sub-contractors the company would use to do the line painting. Ward 2 Councillor Roger Knapp's company – R & M Maintenance – was on the list submitted by the low bidder. Gagnon said the quote from Metro Pavement Markings Ltd. is consistent with those received by the Township for similar road works in the last couple of years.

Although the submitaccept the \$19,890 quote ted quote by Niagara was considerably less than the bid accepted by the Township, Guelph/Eramosa Mayor Chris White's position is firm – it would be totally unacceptable for the Township to waiver on its current position that sitting councillors cannot bid for contracts awarded by the municipality. and at press time, had not

Gagnon said Metro's quote for the work is less than the 2010 operating budget's amount of \$20,250, designated for line painting. Knapp was absent for the meeting, responded to repeated requests for comment.

Huge crowd views Highway 7 plans

Safety and timing of a project to reconstruct Highway 7 through Rockwood were priority issues for the public who attended an open house last Tuesday night at the Rockmosa Community Hall. Approximately 200 residents viewed the plans to reconstruct Highway 7 from Eden Mills Road to the Conservation Area through Rockwood.

The project also includes repairing the Eramosa River Bridge, fixing existing storm sewers and culverts and replacing existing sidewalks through the village of Rockwood.

Guelph/Eramosa Township Mayor Chris White hopes the project will lead to a walkable, pedestrian friendly community with sidewalks running from the south end of Rockwood to the Conservation Area.

While the province is responsible for reconstructing the highway, it is Guelph/Eramosa Township's responsibility to assess pedestrian crossing needs, supply crossing guards and establish school crossing

Rockwood resident Pat Cernick said she hopes the impact on local businesses during construction can be minimised. Several Rockwood homeowners complained that the consultant's design maps were not up-to-date and excluded some of the area's more recent housing developments.

The highway reconstruction will be done in the

spring of 2011 and 2012. During construction the highway will remain open, although local traffic will be reduced to single-lane. People whose driveways are on Highway 7 will be contacted by the MTO prior to construction.

Advance poll dates set for October election

Township council recently approved two vote at an inhouse poll dates for ratepayers to on election day, Monday, vote in advance of the October 25, from 10 a.m. upcoming election – to 12 p.m. – which are Thursday, October 14 from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m., and Saturday, October 16, from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.

A special advance poll will also be held on Friday, October 15, from 8 a.m. to 12 p.m., strictly for residents at the Eden House Care Facility in Eden Mills. Addition-

ally, seniors living at the home will be able to reduced voting hours.

The Township will return to standard voting practices this year, as opposed to the mailedin or telephone voting options used in 2006. In the 2003 election, 187 of 2,726 registered voters - 6.8 per cent – voted at the municipality's two advance polls.
