Adrian Alder is a paramedic with Halton Region Emergency Medical Services (EMS) and he was at the Centre last Tuesday to give a very informative presentation. He told us Halton has 35 vehicles and bikes which cover the emergency needs for the county. If you call 911, the person answering the phone will ask if you are with the patient, and are they breathing? If you are using a land line (house phone) EMS can tell your location, but if you are on a cell phone they have to find out where you are located so, stay calm and give them clear instructions on how to find you.

Once they arrive, they will check the person out and stabilize them and, depending on their requirements, will transport them to the closest available hospital, or one that specializes in their needs.

If a person falls and you are unable to lift them, EMS will assist you. They will assess the person and recommend a trip to the hospital if they feel it is needed, but the choice is your's. If they do not have to take you to the hospital there is no fee charged. If you have to be transported to the hospital, the hospital will bill you \$45.

The homeowner had left the stove burner partially on overnight, and although the gas was tuned off and the house ventilated, there was concern about a potential problem. The house was checked and no levels of gas were found.
