Province should pay for growth costs

Halton Hills Council wants the province to pay for any preparation or planning appeals arising out of challenges of municipal decisions required because of the Places to Grow legislation. The Town also wants Queen's Park to provide intervener funding for any municipalities who get involved in any appeal proceeding relating to the Growth Plan Conformity Exercises.

Defending any Regional or Town Official Plan decision made to conform to the Places to Grow legislation at the Ontario Municipal Board (OMB) could be long and costly, and Halton Hills Mayor Rick Bonnette thinks the province should pick up the tab.

At a recent meeting, he received Council support for a Notice of Motion asking the province to cover the costs of defending the Growth Conformity Exercise including the cost of hiring lawyers, planning consultants and other consultants and witnesses, along with Town/ Region staff time required to mount a defence.

Noting that he said the Places to Grow legislation "scared" him when it was released approximately five years ago, Bonnette told councillors last Monday that he now says, "if you say, you have to pay.'

"Because, quite frankly, you've heard it here, it's no secret, we've had developers sitting right in this council chambers... and they pretty well told us they were going to appeal our decisions at the OMB and this really ticks me off," Bonnette said, adding it is a provincial initiative that said Halton must grow from 400,000 to 780,000 people, and there was a deadline for a Conformity Plan that can now be challenged.

Listing all of the roads, arenas and other services that Halton Hills needs, Bonnette said the Town is not "a rich community" and that it is "wasteful" that it is expected to pay hundreds of thousands of dollars and when they must defend their decisions at the OMB and lawyers get rich at the expense of Halton Hills taxpayers.

Bonnette said the potential costs of defending growth decisions forced by the province could "hamstring" the town and other Ontario municipalities.

The Notice of Motion will be sent to the Premiere, the Minister of Municipal Affairs, all Ontario Party leaders and all Ontario municipalities.


"We've got our orange on." That's the sentiment of many Dutch people in the Acton area, excited as they face the prospect of the Dutch soccer team winning the world title
