Ambitious plans for Thursday as the group formally announced receipt of a \$150,000 Trillium Foundation grant to help pay for the project.

With \$40,000 promised by the Town - money originally earmarked for demolition of the building to make way for nine park-

Heritage Acton chair Ron Birrell outlined the hard work of many dedicated people to rehabilitate and refurbish the Town Hall, and said with the past taken care of, it is time to look to the future.

We're at a point now that the building is vibrant – you wouldn't believe the bookings we are getting for this fall and winter - and it's only going to get better," Birrell said, thanking the Town and the Trillium Foundation for their financial support.

Thanking the original committee that stopped the demolition of the building, Birrrell said in the late 1970's there wasn't the movement to save old buildings like there is today, making the project all that much more difficult.


The proposed 1,475-square-foot expansion would be "smaller and shorter" than the existing Town Hall, but the roofline and brickwork will mimic the original

Architect Brain McCulloch said the addition is much more than just an elevator - plans call for a two-level building, including a grand stairway, new wheelchair accessible entrance, large lobby, upstairs gallery, Citizens' Hall and "an abundance" of much needed storage.

Mayor Rick Bonnette said the plans look "fabulous" and noted it was "quite an experience" for Council to revisit the 1977 decision to put \$40,000 of Town money into the demolition, and then renovation.

Heritage Acton fundraising chair, Kathleen Dills is confident they will raise the necessary money.

"We need your support knocking on doors and we will have some events, like galas, to raise money," Dills said, adding they will apply for other grants to help pay for architectural fees, accessible washrooms and power doors.
