Local firefighter rides across Canada for cancer

Halton Hills firefighter Mark Burger is one of 48 national riders who will support children and their families whose lives have been impacted by cancer by riding in the 2010 Sears National Kids Cancer Ride (www. searsnationalkidscancerride.com) – one of the world's biggest and best charitable cycling events on behalf of childhood cancer. Acton's Paul O'Hara-Hoke is also one of the national riders.

On September 9, the riders will begin a 15-day, 7,200- kilometre epic adventure from Vancouver to Halifax on the third annual Sears National Kids Cancer Ride. They will be joined by thousands of other caring cyclists who will ride shorter distances along the way in communities across the country. And with every pedal stroke, they will raise money for kids and families fighting this debilitating disease.

The route will allow them to visit many of Canada's 17 paediatric cancer centres where cyclists will meet with media and the cancer community to share inspiring stories of strength and

hope on this historic ride. Together, the cyclists will raise millions of dollars on behalf of charities that improve the quality of life for children, and their families, living with cancer. Our destination beyond cancer!

Through community support they can make a difference to the more than 10,000 children in Canada living with cancer, and the 1,400 new children who are diagnosed with it every year, hearing those awful words, "You have cancer."

The goal is to raise \$3-million in donations from Canadians coast to coast. Funds raised will go to national and local programs, including research and education and survivorship initiatives in partnership with the doctors and nurses from the 17 paediatric oncology centers across Canada. Funds raised will also support specific childhood cancer programs in paediatric oncology units and hospitals across Canada.

Donations raised through Coast to Coast Against Cancer Foundation (CTCACF) events are distributed through a strict governance process developed with key members of the cancer community. Donations are distributed to both local and national childhood cancer programs such as:

Essential clinical trial programs and Canadian-wide standards of care in a joint effort with the council representing the 17 paediatric oncology centres and the associated Hospital Foundations.

Support programs for families whose financial resources have been drained by the impact of the long-term care of a child with cancer.

Childhood oncology camping and year round support standards for kids impacted by cancer (including isolated rural areas).

Scholarships, tutoring and educational assistance for childhood cancer survivors.

Plaque for Group of Seven painter unveiled

Today, Heritage Guelph/ Eramosa will unveil a plaque to commemorate Group of Seven artist, A.J. Casson, and his 1926 painting entitled, "Main Street, Rockwood, Ontario.

This plaque, in recognition of A.J. Casson's work, will be installed at the Heaven on 7 Restaurant in Rockwood, which is the approximate location of where he may have painted Main Street, Rockwood in 1926. From this location, facing south in Main Street, you will see some of the buildings depicted in this painting still standing today.

Alfred Joseph Casson (A. J. Casson) was a member of the Group of Seven and the Canadian Group of Painters. The Group of Seven was a group of Canadian landscape painters who painted from approximately 1920 to 1933. A. J. Casson was the youngest member of the Group of Seven, and was best known for his work portraying villages and rural landscapes within Ontario. He was also a cofounder of the remembered," said May-Canadian Society for or Chris White. Painters in Water Colour in 1925. A. J. Casson painted many landscapes within the County of Wellington and the Township of Guelph/Eramosa. The Township of Centre Wellington has a walking tour dedicated to his work in the area. A.J. Casson passed away in 1992 at the age of 94.
